<u>Year 7</u>

Football

An Inspector Calls

On the 10th of November almost all of our year 11 pupils went to see a performance of J.B Priestley's An Inspector Calls, directed by Stephen Daldry, at the Theatre Royal in Nottingham. Pupils are studying this as part of their GCSE English literature exam and were able to gain a great deal of knowledge from a live performance bringing alive what they were reading on a page. For many pupils this was their first experience of the theatre and they both enjoyed the performance and found the whole experience beneficial to their studies.

Wembley Trip

On Tuesday 17th November Mr James, Mr Watts and Mr Cooke took a group of 26 students from GCSE PE to watch the national side against a much fancied France. Due to the disastrous events in Paris just a few days before the fixture, the atmosphere was one filled with pride and emotion in addition to providing an opportunity to reflect on such a tragedy.

Prior to the game a minutes silence was held followed by the whole stadium singing the French National anthem. England fielded a very strong line up including Captain and star striker Wayne Rooney. France dominated early possession pinning England into their half, however 5 minutes before half time young Spurs midfielder Dele Ali broke the deadlock with a screamer that whistled into the top corner past Spurs team mate, Hugo Lloris in the French goal. The goal clearly inspired England and before some students had the opportunity to return to their seats, following half time interval, Captain Wayne Rooney finished with a simple side foot at the far post to give England breathing space. England won the game 2 - 0. NUSA students behaved impeccably and thoroughly enjoyed the England performance.

Parents evening

65% of Year 11 Students' Parents came to the Parent's Evening held on 18.11.15. The <u>Progress Intervention</u> evening was a massive success and another step to build on the Home – School relationship. A big focus was to set new targets for the students as we go into the final 7 months up to the end of Year 11.

Overall attendance

Government targets for overall school attendance is 95% for every pupil. All pupils that fall under this percentage will be monitored. The persistent absentee percentage has changed this year from 85% and below to 90% and below. Pupils who have taken 7 days off by the Christmas holiday will fall into the persistent absentee category.

Lateness

If your child arrives late to school every day, their learning begins to suffer. Being late to school leads to lost learning time. Registers open at 8.45am and pupils are expected to be in their tutor room for that time. Pupils arriving after 8.45am will be marked with code L. Our register closes at 8.47am and pupils who arrive after this time are marked with a code U which is an unauthorised mark. Four U codes in a five week period could lead to a Penalty Notice being issued by the Local Authority.

Medical Appointments

At the moment we are having an increase of students who are signing out during the school day for medical appointments, or not attending for a full day. Where possible we ask that appointments be made out of school time. As a school we will not authorise all day medical appointments unless evidence is provided that the appointment has taken all day. We ask that pupils attend school prior to and after their appointments.

We are grateful to families who support us on this agenda. We are delighted that we will be awarding so many attendance certificates to students in our Christmas assemblies.

Just 17 days absence from school a year could mean a drop in a GCSE grade in all subjects!
